

Dear Starkdale Family,


I can't tell you how joyous I am for the positive response we are receiving from church membership, as well as from friends of our church, over the decision our congregation made to disaffiliate from the Presbyterian Church USA. So far, we have received 233 responses from active members who wish to continue to be part of the Starkdale congregation. We anticipate more. This is so encouraging to our session and me. If anything, such a response proves that our members are respectful and obedient to God's Word.

You will be pleased to know that our session is now meeting frequently for the purposes of investigating the steps needed to be taken toward our future as a church. We have meetings to study the doctrines and forms of government of other Presbyterian denominations. Other meetings will include representatives from the Evangelical Presbyterian Church (the third largest Presbyterian denomination) to share with us about their policies and expectations from us if we decide to join them. After the session makes a decision regarding the denomination to join, we will call for a congregational meeting to discuss our findings and to vote. The session is very careful about making this important decision as well as keeping all matters in prayer. Moreover, the Upper Ohio Valley Presbytery is presently taking the necessary steps toward graciously dismissing to the denomination of our choice. This should take place soon.

With all that going on, our church continues to strive and to grow. Praise the Lord! God has great plans for the future ministry of Starkdale. He promised in his word that he honors those who honor him.

Please continue to pray for God's will for the direction of our future ministry. Pray that we do not lose sight of whose church we are, and whose agenda we must follow. Christ alone must be glorified. Starkdale is his church and we cannot dare to think of ourselves otherwise. Everything we do must be preceded with prayers as we seek to know the mind of Christ and his will for us.

I look forward to a more exciting ministry, to more growth in our understanding of the scriptures, to a noticeable increase in our numbers and ministerial opportunities, and to a wonderful fellowship of peace, unity and love among us all.



Having said this, I pray that each one of us become faithful to attending worship, participating in Bible learning opportunities, reaching out to family members, friends, neighborhoods, and business associates. Let us do our part faithfully. God will do the rest. We must prepare the stage for God to strengthen us in the faith and to save the lost.





February's selection of "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken" is an incredibly beautiful poem in and of itself written by John Newton. The beautiful arrangement of music added to it by Franz Joseph Haydn makes it one of the most moving and spiritually moving hymns of the church.

Born in Rohrau, Austria, the son of a wheelwright, Franz Joseph Hayden became one of the world's great concert composers and is today regarded as the "Father of the Symphony". At the age of eight, Franz was sent to the Roman Catholic school of St. Stephen's in Vienna. His musical genius was evident even as a child.

In 1761, at the age of twenty-nine, he became musical director to the Hungarian family of Esterhazy. Their palace had

its own chapel, theater, and concert room for which Haydn had full charge, plus an orchestra, choir and soloists to render his compositions.

For thirty years creating new musical masterpieces for the palace of Esterhazy was both a joy and a necessity for Haydn. In music and in conversation Haydn cheered people by his happy touches of Croatian peasant humor and religious feeling. When in 1797 Haydn visited England, Oxford University conferred upon him the honorary Doctorate of Music degree and he enjoyed great success among the nobility and royalty.

During the illustrious career Haydn wrote over one hundred symphonies, twenty two operas, four oratorios and an untold amount of chamber music. The music to which we sing John Newton's hymn, *Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken*, was originally written by Haydn as a national anthem and was first sung in 1797 on the birthday of Emperor Franz II.

Franz Joseph Hayden died May 31, 1809 at the age of 77.

Glorious things of thee are spoken, Zion, city of our God; He whose word cannot be broken Formed thee for His own abode; On the rock of Ages founded, What can shake thy sure repose? With salvation's wall surrounded, Thou mayst smile at all they foes.

See, the streams of living waters, springing from eternal love, Well supply they sons and daughters, And all fear of want remove: Who can faint, wile such a river Ever flows from their to assuage? Grace which, like the Lord, the Giver, Never fails from age to age.

Round each habitations hovering, See the cloud and fire appear
For a glory and a covering, showing that the Lord is near!
Glorious things of thee are spoken, Zion, city of our God;
He, whose words cannot be broken, Formed thee for His own abode. Amen.


ON THE BOOKSHELF

We have among us teachers, librarians, attorneys, physicians, business and medical professionals. The congregation is also the church home to many retired people and members whose professions it is to just keep our world running smoothly by their services. All of us though, have one thing in common, the joy a good book can bring to our daily routine and lives.

This month's review is offered by our church office manager. Rose Mary has had lots of time to read during her extended time off with illness in the autumn. She found herself reaching for her well worn copy of "At Home in Mitford" by Jan Karon, a New York Times Bestseller.

The lead character of the book is the Episcopalian minister Father Timothy, a middle aged single man who is friend to all who know him in the small North Carolinian town of Mitford. The rector's forthright secretary, Emma Garret, worries about her employer, as she sees past his Christian cheerfulness into his aching loneliness. Slowly but surely, the empty places in Father Tim's heart do get filled. The surprise of his first friend "Barnabas" comes early in the story and the readers heart is endeared to him immediately. Dooley Barlowe, a rough around the edges child, shows up in need of love and guidance. Father Timothy blindly steps into the role of caregiver and finds his heart being swept away by this needy child. The interesting characters abound in this well told story.



The "Mitford Years" is a series of nine books and specialty books along the way too. They are light, entertaining, laughable, spiritual, and emotionally moving stories that will touch your heart and make you wish you really could go to "Mitford".

The first book, "At Home in Mitford" is readily available at the library, Amazon.com, Wal-Mart, etc. It is very popular and you should have no problem finding a copy to read, download to your Kindle, or find it on audio cassette or CD.
