Dear Friends,

In June I was appointed to be the visitation pastor of Starkdale. I go out with Pastor Makari, usually on Tuesday and Wednesday, visiting the sick, the shut ins, and those in the hospital and nursing homes. I am also available to visit at any time including nights and week-ends.

I thought it would be a good idea to tell you a little bit about me. Before coming to Starkdale five years ago, I was the pastor at Zion United Church of Christ on North Fifth St. in Steubenville. The old Paramount Theater used to be right across the street from Zion. I was the pastor there for eighteen years.

Before that I served a two pint charge in Walnut Creek and Winesburg over in Amish Country. The first church I served was in Swanuton, Vermont, which is near the Canadian border. That is where I was ordained back in 1983. It's hard to believe that was 30 years ago.

My wife Susan and I have lived in Wintersville since 1990. We are blessed to have four children, Tom, Josh, Hope and Abby. While putting them through college, I took a part-time job with Valley Hospice as a chaplain. The job expanded into a full time

Presbytery of the Alleghenies**September meeting report**

The 9th. stated meeting of the Presbytery of the Alleghenies (POA) met on September 27 & 28, 2013 at Memorial Park Church, Allison Park, PA. Ed Carlson, Moderator, RE, has completed his duties for 2013 and Dean Weaver, Moderator, TE, for 2014 was welcomed and moderated the meeting.

Bruce Allison, Stated Clerk, RE, reported that there is concern over the inability of new churches, leaving the PCUSA and coming into the Presbytery of the Alleghenies, to pay their per capita fees due to the large amount of monies assessed them by the PCUSA. This is creating a financial hardship for the Presbytery to pay their staff and the General Assembly has not been able to offset the cost. Mr. Allison stated, "other presbyteries are feeling what we're feeling and we're looking into this matter." It was announced that the Pastor's Retreat will be Jan. 19th - 21st at Ligonier Camp and all pastors are encouraged to attend for training, sharing ideas and fellowship. Two TE, previously ordained, were examined on their theological views and accepted. Meeting adjourned. The next meeting will be held on November 23 at First Presbyterian, Beaver Pa. It has been a busy and blessed month for the Starkdale Youth Ministry. In the past few weeks I have had the privilege of:

- ◆Speaking twice at the Jefferson County Christian School.
- ◆Leading and bringing the message for two Sunday worship services with the participation of our youth (readings, singing, liturgy, prayers etc.)
- ◆Leading five Bible Study classes while Pastor Philip was gone.
- ◆Attending four football games and two soccer matches to support our student athletes and band members. It was a great blessing to interact with a number of parents and extended family members of students at these events. .

- ◆Meeting with the Superintendent of Schools for Steubenville and the principal of Harding Middle School. They have asked me to speak to 350 Middle School students at Harding Middle School "Morals" on November 25th as this day has been set aside to emphasize good moral behavior to the students. My topic will be on the dangers and blessings of social media.
- ◆Continuing to lead Starkdale Youth Ministry on Sunday evenings. Twenty-

five attended the first regular meeting on the topic "Girls, Guys & God... Answering Pre-Teen & Teen Questions About Love, Sex, & Relationships From God's Perspective". We had 6 new people attend for the first time. The talk and small groups' time were well received.

◆Welcoming Kylie Paris to the youth ministry team. God is blessing the Starkdale Youth Ministry and is giving us the opportunity to minister to many of our youth and young adults. Dear Starkdale family (Members, Worship Guests, and Friends),

During the month of October, our congregation was severely impacted by the loss of three dear people whose connection with many of us, we shall continue to treasure beyond the expression of words and for many years to come. The death of Cliff Allan in particular has spiritually blessed me and those who were around him during his final moments on earth. First, Cliff was an invaluable member of Starkdale for a long time. Second, he was so close to the majority of our church members; not only that, but always positive always warm and friendly. Third, his handy-work which he freely and generously used for the enhancement of our church facilities was a gift that has exceeded by far our sense of appreciation. Fourth, his related families, many of whom are active members of our congregation, are among the greatest of our ministerial assets and blessings. But fifthly and most importantly, the real spiritual blessing with which Cliff blessed me personally was that he affirmed his belief in Jesus Christ on several occasions, and had verbally reaffirmed his understanding of salvation to Rev. Bauman and me a few hours before his departure to be with the Lord. He openly and clearly shared with Rev Bauman and me that his most repeated Bible verse during his dying moments and which he kept reciting to himself was "Though I walk through the valley of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me." It was at that moment that I poured uncontrollable tears (something that I don't usually do

with the dying). My tears were partially tears of deep sadness over losing a genuine church member and friend; but mostly, they were tears of joyful appreciation and thanksgiving for the Good News of God that has the power to bring us sinners to salvation by grace and make us the recipients of the perfection of health, happiness, and eternal life with God in his glorious heaven.

A major reason for sharing about this in this issue of the Chimes is two-fold:

First, we westerners are part of a culture that refuses to think or converse about death. Almost 80% of the TV commercials are geared toward a denial of ageing and dying. Even funeral arrangements and the viewing hours they provide have the tendency to make the scene of death bearable as we see our loved ones looking their best. There is in our culture a spirit that denies death. Death may come to others, but not to me. I am still somewhat young and healthy, and if I take care of myself, I have many years ahead of me to live and enjoy life. While this may be a good attitude by which to live the life that God has given us, the concern is that death does not have rules, does not abide by certain standards, does not follow a certain routine, does not postpone or delay his ugly grip when it is time, and more importantly, death is not a respecter of persons regardless of how young they may be or how healthy. As you may recall, within the same week Cliff passed, we had two other funer-

Speaking of Kitchens:

There have been many requests for this recipe from the kitchen of Peggy and Joe Rekai:

Using 2 cookie sheets, carefully remove dough from 2 packages of Pillsbury Crescent rolls and place dough (in once piece) in the center of each sheet. Do not separate into triangles. With fingers, press together the perforations in the dough. Bake 11 minutes (according to package directions).

Mix together: 2 -8 oz. packages of cream cheese, 1 cup mayonnaise, and 1 package of Hidden Valley Original Ranch Dressing. When pastry is cool, spread cream cheese mixture on top. Chop the following into pea-sized pieces:

3/4 cup green and red peppers
3/4 cup carrots
1 cup cauliflower
1 cup onion
1 cup broccoli

Mix chopped vegetables together and press into cream cheese mixture; top with grated cheese (if desired). Refrigerate 3 hours before serving. Cut into small sized pieces.

als of two lovely ladies (one was 39 and the other was 45).

A second reason for my sharing about death in this issue of the Chimes is slightly different. It is my response to a dear member of our church who asked me “why do we only talk about death at funeral services?” “Doesn’t it make sense that if 100% of us would sooner or later die that we should be freely involved in discussions about the subject?”

That question caught me by surprise. It showed me that I too have been following our cultural trend of denying the unknown and hiding our heads in the sand about the fear of the unknown.

Yes, we need to prepare for the inevitable. We need to know more about the two different destinies that follow death. We need to do so through questions and answers, through Bible studies and prayers, through grief support groups and counseling, and of course, we need to be close to those who are undergoing the grief process, to befriend them, console them and help them understand God’s promises to those who believe in Christ. The Bible calls death “gain”, “moving from tent- living to mansion- living, to mansions not made by human hands”, “the end of a long race at which time we receive the crown of life eternal” ... etc.

Very soon, possibly beginning in January, Rev. Tom Bullard and I will provide an opportunity for people to come and talk freely about their fears and their sorrows. Rev. Bullard was a chaplain at Valley Hospice for many years, as well as pastor of a church for over twenty years. Together, we would like to make ourselves available, not just for

people of our church family, but also for community people who wish to begin dealing with this most urgent of subjects.

First, it is eternally risky not to be prepared for death. That goes for all of us. By this, I mean that we must know beyond the shadow of a doubt where we would spend eternity (in heaven or in hell). The Bible shows us how to be eternally with the Lord and how to avoid spending eternity with Satan’s company.

Second, grief is spiritually damaging if not dealt and coped with the biblical way.

So, please help me connect to people you know who are at the present either facing death or have already been stricken by the death of loved ones. Please speak with such persons, get their permission to add them to our pastoral care list, and provide us with the information on how to contact them.

On a more helpful and practical note, I strongly invite you all (members and friends of Starkdale) to participate in the most promising ecumenical weekly Bible study.

Our studies cover all the biblical topics and are scholarly written by one of the most reliable professors in the United States. Those studies are geared to help us comprehend basic biblical truths we can never dream to learn on our own.
