October 15-16 - Evangelism Retreat




STARKDALE ANNUAL EVANGELISM RETREAT



ing at the annual church picnic on Sunday, August 29. I hope that many new faces will appear on Wednesday nights from 7:15 to 8:30. If no one stares at you when you sing Happy Birthday, we would welcome you as a new member. If people do stare at you when you sing, but you have a burning desire to praise God by singing in the choir, Eleanor Hewitt and I can coach you until you are ready. We have both taught voice for many years and it is quite possible to sing in tune. Most of the time, it's not that people can't sing, but that they aren't hearing correctly. For example, many years ago, after singing at a funeral in Weirton, I was approached by the pastor conducting the service. She began talking to me with great embarrassment and told me that she had been humiliated when her mother turned off the PA system during the hymn at Sunday services. She asked if I could help her. We began a series of lessons to help her sing in tune. With hard work and determination, she reached her goal and sang a solo in her church six months later. Her mom was very surprised.

For the time being, I will continue to volunteer as your adult choir director. I am also going to start a children's choir for grades 1 to 8. Rehearsals will be held on Wednesdays from 6:30 to 7:10 beginning on September 1. High schoolers are welcomed in the adult choir. If enough high schoolers are interested in having their own choir, we will start a choir just for them. My experience includes 15 years of directing 3 youth choirs at the Cove Presbyterian Church in Weirton as well as adult handbell choirs.



LOVE ONE ANOTHER



CHRISTIAN HOSPITALITY

Luke 14:1-14

One Sabbath, when Jesus went to eat in the house of a prominent Pharisee, he was being carefully watched. There in front of him was a man suffering from dropsy. Jesus asked the Pharisees and experts in the law, "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath or not?" But they remained silent. So taking hold of the man, he healed him and sent him away.

Then he asked them, "If one of you has a son or an ox that falls into a well on the Sabbath day, will you not immediately pull him out?" ⁶And they had nothing to say.

When he noticed how the guests picked the places of honor at the table, he told them this parable: "When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take the place of honor, for a person more distinguished than you may have been invited. If so, the host who invited both of you will come and say to you, 'Give this man your seat.' Then, humiliated, you will have to take the least important place. But when you are invited, take the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he will say to you, 'Friend, move up to a better place.' Then you will be honored in the presence of all your fellow guests. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

Then Jesus said to his host, "When you give a luncheon or dinner, do not invite your friends, your brothers or relatives, or your rich neighbors; if you do, they may invite you back and so you will be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed. Although they cannot repay you, you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

(Taken from information from the Sunday, August 29th sermon):

SERMON SYNOPSIS: This sermon deals with the subject of **showing hospitality to strangers**. During his ministry, Jesus was intentional in reaching out to the poor, the forsaken, and those rejected by society (those who did not meet the social standards of the community in which they lived), the captives of bad habits, and the demon-possessed. In today's New Testament text, Jesus shows us that welcoming such peoples to our gatherings and tables has its own rewards at the time of our resurrection. **First**, we need to understand that it is by the grace of God that we are blessed to have what we have and to live the comfortable lives that we live. **Second**, we need to remind ourselves that at any given moment we can become the type of people listed above (i.e. the despised and rejected). **Third**, our blessings are to be shared with all, especially with those not related or connected to us in any way. **Fourth**, loving people and showing them God's love through the things we share with them is the greatest witness any Christian can perform.





William Bradbury—Wrote the music to many hymns including “Jesus Loves Me” and “Just As I Am” (1816-1868)

William Bradbury was born at York, Maine. His father a veteran of the Revolutionary War, was a choir leader. William went to Boston when he was fourteen and lived at the home of Sumner Hill, a musician and teacher. While there, he entered the Boston Academy of Music and joined Lowell Mason’s Choir at the Bowdoin Street Church. Within a short time he became organist at several small churches in succession, until he reached the Baptist Tabernacle in New York City. Here, he also conducted singing classes much like those of his teacher, the renown Lowell Mason in Boston.

In 1847, Bradbury took his family to Europe and studied music in Leipzig, Germany. Upon his return to New York he devoted his time to teaching, conducting musical conventions, composing and editing books. In 1854 William, with his brother established the Bradbury Piano Company which later became the Knabe Piano Company. William Bradbury was associated with the publishing of fifty-nine collections of sacred and secular music. He also composed a number of glee books and the *Devotional Hymn And Tune Book* for Baptist churches. (Quoted from *One hundred & one famous hymns* p. 136 by Charles Johnson)

Though the source of this hymn’s words was anonymous, there is an obvious reference to the 23rd Psalm. At our recent service at the Carriage Inn, Pastor Philip’s sermon referred to the promises in this psalm as a better Life Insurance Policy than the ones we can buy in this world.

CALL THE PRAYER CHAIN

Over 20 years ago, Doris Barnhouse and Frances Dornbush developed the Prayer Chain at Starkdale Presbyterian Church. The chain is a telephone tree consisting of volunteer groups. Each volunteer prayer group has a captain and five members of Starkdale women who pray for any requested aid. One way to remember Denise and the team is to consider the daily routine changes they will encounter. Below are recipes that your family may like to try during the time of the missionary trip. Learning about the culture is a great way for the children to develop an interest in missions.

Sweet Potato Pudding

2 large sweet potatoes, peeled and chopped

2 to 3 teaspoons honey

2 Tablespoons margarine

1 egg separated

Rind and juice of one orange.

Preheat oven to 375°. Place the sweet potatoes in a saucepan of boiling water and cook until they are soft, about 10 minutes. Put in a bowl and mash. Add all the other ingredients except the egg white and mix them together. In a separate bowl, beat egg white until stiff, fold into first mixture. Spoon into a 9 inch casserole and bake for about 45 minutes or until golden brown.

Fried White Ants

1 cup day-old white ants
(these are large termites, in the winged stage).

1/2 cup water

2 T. margarine

Salt to taste

Clean ants by removing wings and any foreign matter. Place insects in salted water and boil over high heat until water has evaporated. Reduce heat and add margarine. Cover and simmer for 3 minutes. Remove from heat and serve immediately.
