Pastor's Message

Dear Starkdale Family,

Ecclesiastes 3:1, 4 tells us, "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven: ... a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance ..."

Several of us have expressed that we have just had the coldest winter in decades. What a reminder this is for us to joyfully welcome spring, embrace it, give thanks for each of its days, and never take its beauty and warmth for granted!

From our Christian perspective, we may liken the winter months to the time when we were spiritually cold, alienated from God, and lifeless because of the thick and dark clouds of our sins and evil. Likewise, we may liken spring to the time when we came to Christ whose light has shone on us, and whose love and warmth have blossomed in and through our lives.

Spring is a welcome season. Spring spells hope. Spiritually speaking, the soul's winter is a time for weeping and mourning because of the bad news of sin. I pray that none of us is still captive to such a winter. The soul's spring no

doubt is a time for laughing and dancing because of the Good News of salvation by grace. Is it by accident then that Easter is a major spring celebration? Not at all; spring and Easter have always belonged to each other.

Spring and Easter are in every sense of the phrase a union of divine origin. They both confirm that there is more to our earthly life than that which we judge as dying or dead. Spring speaks of newness in nature; Easter speaks of newness in God's Spirit. Both spring and Easter introduce beauty as a sure fact of life and proclaim that there is more to the reality of human life than what we are able to experience by the senses. Both spring and Easter call us to believe in "what shall be". Spring affirms that though winter may bring things to a halt, the time will come when the sky will be blue again, the birds will sing to the melody of fresh air, and flowers will bloom in harmony with nature's colors. Easter believes that the shadow of the valley of death may make an end to the breath of life, but the time is coming when heaven will show forth, and souls will be revived incorruptible, singing and dancing to the melody of God's glorious presence. 
They are intimately united as one.

On their anniversary each year, spring and Easter remind us to keep on believing, to keep on hoping, and to keep on affirming the promise that he who gives beauty and life to dry and dead things will do the same for us. The darkness of Good Friday may seem as the end of the story, but Easter Sunday is God's unfailing promise for a new and unending chapter in glory.

JJ HYMN NOTES JJ

During the autumn of 1873, Horatio Gates Spafford and his family planned a wonderful trip to Europe to visit relatives and friends. As winter began to chill their Chicago home, Horatio, his wife Anna, and their four young daughters, Maggie, Tanetta, Annie, and Bessie (ranging in age from eighteen months to twelve years), began to anticipate the sea voyage and reunion. When the time for the trip drew close, Spafford's business encountered some difficulties that required him to remain at home. Determined not to deprive the family of the anticipated excursion, however, he kissed his wife and daughters good-bye, bade them Godspeed, and promised to join them as soon as possible.

The Spafford women embarked on the French steamer, SS Ville de Havre, and began their trans-Atlantic journey. Off the coast of Newfoundland, however, tragedy struck. The ship collided with an English sailing vessel, the Loch Earn, ripping a gaping hole in the ship's haul. So massive was the damage that the Ville de Havre plunged to the bottom of the frigid sea within twenty minutes. In the moments before the ship sank, Anna Spafford gathered her four young girls to her side and prayed with them, holding the youngest in her arms. As the icy waters of the North Atlantic swept over the decks, the three older children disappeared, and eventually even the baby was washed from her mother's embrace. Alone and near death herself, Anna was spotted from a lifeboat and plucked from the sea.

It was ten days before the survivors of the shipwreck were landed safely in Cardiff, Wales. From there Anna Spafford wired her anxious husband a brief and poignant message: "Saved alone." Boarding the next available ship, Horatio sailed to England, where he was reunited with his grieving wife.

The Spafford's close friend, evangelist Dwight L. Moody, was in Edinburgh, Scotland, at the time of the tragedy and came from there to join the bereaved couple, He later reported of that meeting that though they were experiencing deep sorrow, the Spaffords never lost their abiding faith in God. They attested to this with their affirmation to Moody, "It is well. The will of God is done." Returning to Chicago, Spafford rejoined his legal practice, once again becoming active in the local Presbyterian church as an elder and working with the YMCA.

A visitor to his office two years after the shipwreck remarked about the framed cable above Spafford's desk carrying the words, "Saved alone." Retelling the tale, Spafford again affirmed, "It is well. God's will be done". He would later report that the phrase, "It is well," inspired him to formulate the words of a poem subsequently set to music by Philip P. Bliss.


With the writing of this very personal, yet universally applicable hymn, Spafford seemed to turn the focus of his energies from his law practice to the fulfillment of a lifelong dream. In 1881, at the age of fifty-three, he and his wife left the United States to settle in Jerusalem. There they found the American colony where they spent the rest of their lives.

Although Horatio Spafford's family did not live on beyond the nineteenth century, his beautiful hymn of faith lives today as a tribute to the faith of a loving Christian father. Others facing trials as great as the sea billows that swept over the sinking Ville de Havre have learned to say with Spafford, "It is well with my soul."


Carolyn and Jody Glaub will be honored at the Jefferson County Fourth Street Health Center Gala on April 10 at St. Florian Hall.
