Dear Starkdale Family, (members and friends),

I continue to pray for allmember-participation in ministry. Can you imagine what it would be like if all our talents and heartfelt convictions are put to a good Christian use?

We have six commissions (Administration, Evangelism, Fellowship, Nurture, Outreach, and Worship). Each of these commissions is in great need for workers. A list of the responsibilities of each commission, which may be copied and sent to you, is available at the church office.

Here is an idea: If you haven't yet been asked to serve in any capacity, ask for the list and read it, see where your talents may be used effectively, and contact the church office. Let Rose Mary, our office manager, know about the ministry in which you wish to serve. She in turn would contact the chair of that ministry and submit your name.

There is a saying that I heard once or twice in America, which makes great sense: "If followers lead, leaders will follow." This is true of any organization including the church. When church members are enthused about ministry and are willing to give of themselves selflessly to the work of the church, church leaders have no choice but to desire their input and seek to use their God-given talents.

I urge you then to help Starkdale acquire the enthusiasm of the early church (Acts 2:42-47), to let the enthusiasm of the early church fuel us with the power of God's Spirit and energize us to do things we never thought possible. Let us permit this fire of the Holy Spirit to spread wildly among us and into our communities. Let us let the wind of God's Spirit carry its flames to many homes and neighborhoods in our area. Let this fire of God's Spirit keep us from "taking the back seat" and falling into sleep, especially in a time when all the forces of evil are fully awake and working on silencing the voice and ministry of the church. In other words, let us be true followers of Jesus Christ so we may become spiritually contagious so others may desire the saving grace that God has graciously given each of us. Let us receive afresh the power of God's Spirit which, not even Rome

with its fame and might could put out.

As a church we will continue to be intentional in our efforts for more evangelism, wider range of Christian fellowship, home visitation by officers and church members, increased financial support, growing opportunities for biblical knowledge and understanding, and community wide mission that would lead many to the Lord.

Thank you for fanning the flame of faith. Thank you for being the type of faithful witnesses that you are. Thank you for being an invaluable part of inviting and introducing many to our church.

I look forward to seeing more and more of this type of ministry in and through Starkdale.



EXERCISE FOR PEOPLE OVER 50 Begin by standing on a comfortable surface, where you have plenty of room at each side.

With a 5-lb potato bag in each hand, extend your arms straight out from your sides and hold them there as long as you can. Try to reach a full minute, and then relax.

Each day you'll find that you can hold this position for just a bit longer. After a couple of weeks, move up to 10-lb potato bags.

Then try 50-lb potato bags and then eventually try to get to where you can lift a 100-lb potato bag in each hand and hold your arms straight for more than a full minute.

After you feel confident at that level, put a potato in each bag.

COMPARATIVE RELIGION BOOKS 1. Handbook of Today's Religions by Josh McDowell /1993/Hardcover \$16.99 (CBD)

One of the best reference books available on the religions and cults present in our time. Four books are combined into one easy-to-use volume. The four books, which each became a section of the compilation, are: *Non Christian Religions; the Occult; Secular Religions; the Cults.* Powerful individually, together the books are a powerhouse of vital information for Christians on those worldviews which challenge and attack Christianity. This reference book offers one of the best looks (from a Christian perspective) at each of the various religions and worldviews that now exist.

2. **Jesus among Other Gods** by Ravi Zacharias /2002 / paperback / \$10.99 (CBD price)

No such thing as absolute truth? Christian apologist Ravi Zacharias' work is a brilliant defense of the unique truth of the Christian message. Exposing the futility of Islam, Hinduism and Buddhism, he also highlights his own journey from despair and meaninglessness to the discovery that Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life. 195 pages.

3. Correcting the Cults: Expert Responses to Their Scripture Twisting by Norman L. Geisler, Ron Rhodes/ 2005 / paperback / \$28.00 (CBD price)

How do cults use scripture to ensnare millions? Discover the ways that Mormonism, Jehovah's Witnesses, the New Age movement, and others misinterpret the Bible to support their own doctrines. Comprehensive, accessible, and intelligent, this reliable resource will equip you to understand aberrant faith systems, reason with their adherents, and point them toward Jesus Christ! Formerly titled *When Cultists Ask.* 368 pages.

4. The Complete Bible Answer Book (Collector's Edition) by Hank Hanegraaff/ 2009 / Hardcover / \$14.99 (CBD price) Hanegraaff has heard it all! As host of the *Bible Answer Man*, he interacts with many believers---and non-believers---who are plagued with questions about faith. Now in this beautiful collector's edition, you'll find his rock-solid responses on over 170 topics---including parenting, other religions, fear, sin, and salvation. Includes suggested resources for further exploration. 560 pages.

5. Christianity's Family Tree *What Other Christians Believe and Why* by Adam Hamilton / 2007 / soft cover / 133 pages \$9.60 (Amazon books)

A brief history and major belief of eight Christian denominations and faith traditions are presented: Orthodox, Catholic, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Episcopalian, Baptist, Pentecostal and the United Methodist.




APOLOGETICS

Charles Wesley and John Zundel

Love divine, all love excelling, Joy of Heav'n to earth come down! Fix in us Thy humble dwelling; All thy faithful mercies crown. Jesus, thou art all compassion, Pure, unbounded love thou art; Visit us with Thy salvation; Enter ev'ry trembling heart.

Breathe, O breathe Thy loving Spirit Into ev'ry troubled breast! Let us all in Thee inherit, Let us find that second rest. Take away our bent to sinning, Alpha and Omega be; End of faith, as its beginning, Set our hearts at liberty.

Come, Almighty to deliver, Let us all thy life receive; Suddenly return, and never, Nevermore Thy temples leave: Thee we would be always blessing, Serve Thee as Thy hosts above, Pray, and praise Thee without ceasing, Glory in Thy perfect love.

Finish then Thy new creation; Pure and spotless let us be; Let us see Thy great salvation, Perfectly restored in Thee: Changed from glory into glory, till in Heav'n we take our place, Till we cast our crowns before Thee, Lost in wonder, love, and praise.

John Zundel

John Zundel was born in 1815 at Hochdorf, Germany. He began his professional career as organist at St. Anne's Lutheran Church and as bandmaster of the Imperial Horse Guards in St. Petersburg (now Leningrad, Russia). He came to the United States in 1847. After playing briefly at other churches he began his great career at the Plymouth Church in Brooklyn on January 1, 1850. There, with the famous Henry Ward Beecher, the great orator, they drew not only New Yorkers, but hundreds of visitors from other states, Sunday after Sunday. Attending the Plymouth Church in Brook-

lyn was an experience to write home about, with Beecher's powerful sermons, Zundel's inspired organ playing and the best congregational singing of its day. While in the United States John Zundel published three books of music. Of his last, Christian Heart Songs (1870), Zundel said " It has required almost a lifetime to compose its contents". In 1877 John Zundel retired and returned to his native land.

Charles Wesley

Charles Wesley, the poet of Methodism, was the eighteenth of nineteen children born to the distinguished Anglican minister Rev. Samuel Wesley and his wife Susanna. Born at Epworth, Lincolnshire, England, Charles, with his brother John (who was three years older) were destined to have a profound effect upon the world in which we live.

At Oxford, the brothers with George Whitefield formed the Oxford Holy Club to counter prevailing attitudes. Its members were expected to follow a disciplined approach to Bible study, worship, communion and visitation to the sick and imprisoned. Because of their methodical practice of religious concepts the members of the Holy Club were soon referred to as Methodists by fellow students.

Charles obtained his M.A. from Oxford in 1732 and in 1735 was ordained a deacon and elder in the Church of England. Later in 1735 thirteen members of the Holy Club (including John and Charles) set sail for Savannah, Georgia, where they planned to work as missionaries. Aboard ship they met a group of Moravians and John Wesley became so interested in their hymn singing he began to study German, making translations of their German hymns for his group of "Methodists". Charles returned to England in 1736 and John followed two years later. Back in England, both Charles and John became friends of the Moravian leader Count von Zinzendort. In 1738 each had dynamic personal conversion experiences and full of evangelical zeal, they set out to proclaim the message of Jesus to England, Ireland, and Wales. Charles gave the movement the wings of music and developed its practical theology in his hymns. During his life Charles wrote some 6,500 hymns giving wings to the Methodist movement.

I want to be an example for people, and let them know it's never too late to open your eyes and change. There is always time to change. If no one wants to help people change like I see myself starting to do-I will. I don't want to keep going down their road call failure. I want to take the next exit to a successful life and a new me. There is always room for improvement. I didn't make level 3. I had a chance to, but I felt another two weeks I should be ready to take on all the expectations for level 3 that I need to. I feel I am not yet ready.

I have been in counseling—doing good there also. I have NA and AA meetings. My family comes to visit me on Sundays.


