A Message from the Pastor -

Worship Guests, and Friends),

Sadly, this is my last open letter to a congregation I have loved so dearly. I can't imagine what it would be like for Vickey and me after July 30, which marks my last day of serving you as pastor. Of course, staying in town and visiting with you from time to time will make the separation easier to bear. In addition, I am committed to finishing our study in the Book of Revelation each Tuesday until the study is completed. We are now in chapter 7 and we have 15 more chapters to go. Yet, a new pastor may join your staff and may feel more comfortable if he leads the class.

Regarding your future pastor, I am confident that the leadership of both, the Presbytery of the Alleghenies and the Starkdale Session will see to it that the right pastor is called. The Presbytery of the Alleghenies is deeply committed to the health and spiritual growth of its congregations. Moreover, a good number of the Starkdale Session has attended a variety of seminars on church vitalization and growth. They know how to conduct envisioning processes that involve the entire congregation to participate. The envisioning process would help elders and church members decide the type of pastor they would like to have. Members must be present in big numbers for those envisioning meetings. The congregation as a whole needs to be part of planning for the future.

While it may not be my place now to ask you to participate, I am compelled to even beg you to do so for the following five reasons:

First, a new pastor would have an extremely difficult time if he senses that much should have been taken care of by the church before his arrival but hasn't. This would **delay and possibly hinder his effectiveness** from day one. The new pastor will find himself spending a great deal of time figuring out what the vision of the congregation for their ministry together is, rather than attending to the demands of his call as a minister of the church.

Second, it would thrill the new pastor to sense from day one that the

The committee developed the following description of characteristics and qualifications needed in a person who would fill the position of Pastor:

Be warm, caring, loving, and nurturing to a congregation that is desiring to grow.

Possess good leadership skills.

Possess good time management skills.

To be professional in and out of the pulpit by holding himself or herself to high standards of living.

To have a heart for God.

To stand by his or her convictions.

We believed that he possessed all of those qualifications and characteristics.

We invited him to preach at the Mingo Presbyterian Church. The PNC voted to offer a call to him and THE REST IS HISTORY!

Praise God for sending Philip Makari to lead us into a shared experience of God's awesome presence.

THE JOURNEY

On June 14, 2004, Brad Albert, Marge Allan, Ella Jane Burns, Donald Eft, Carolyn Glaub, Donna Huff, and Doris Wickham met for the first time as the newly elected Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). I remember feeling a bit overwhelmed at the task at hand. However, our congregation, prior to this, had met for 8 - 2 hour sessions for revisioning. Following the meetings, the active elders met for a day long retreat to pull together the information gained. This was not to see what the congregation wanted for our church, but to pray for God to give us discernment over the information gleaned from the congregation. We knew that God would give us clear direction, and He did.

Four and one half months later on October 31st, I, as chairman of the committee, entered our Church Informational Form (CIF) into the computer on the Presbyterian Church, USA website. On November 1, 2004, The Reverend Dr. Philip Makari's Pastor Informational Form (PIF) arrived in my e-mail. He was a computer match. Little did we know that he had already been sent our CIF. I e-mailed him to let him know that we were interested in interviewing him. On November 3, he replied that he too was very interested. We also contacted the other applicants and conducted telephone interviews and continued to make decisions as a PNC.

God kept leading us to Philip. The words and comments used to describe him from his numerous references were kindest, joy, neat, exciting, uplifting sermons, biblically based, liked to entertain, excellent Bible study teacher, did visitations and counseling, man of God, good personality, superb preacher, loves fellowship, evangelist, good sense of humor, loves children, and was loved by everyone.

The committee listened to several of Philip's sermons and felt that we needed to meet him personally for a face to face interview. In late November, we met for dinner at the Steubenville Country Club. We conducted a formal interview and continued to believe that God's hand was present in this decision. I flew to Florida to visit my son and his

Starkdale congregation has done their homework in preparation for this new phase in their ministry, that they have committed wholeheartedly to their goals and have understood that church work is the work of the whole church (the priesthood of all believers), and that they would not take him for granted.

Third, there is a great sense of fulfillment and satisfaction as church members work together with elders, deacons, church staff, and representatives of the Presbytery. This is a rare blessing that many congregations miss. Some of the benefits of members' participation are projecting unity, learning from each other about what is important for their ministry, empowering communication skills, reaching a moment when they all are on the same page, being clear about objectives which is a key to avoiding future conflicts, showing the new pastor their cooperation in making ministry somewhat a pleasant experience for him, expressing to him that they respect his leadership and that they have done all they could to help him be the pastor God wants him to be.

Fourth, the envisioning process is like the blueprints to a building. While the mission of the church is the Great Commission (i.e. making disciples), the vision of the church points out to goals, methods, personnel, timetable, and other factors that would make such mission a reality and a big success. The vision is the guiding light, the roadmap, the channel by which the mission is accomplished.

Fifth, when all members are part of the envisioning process, clear about their vision, and sure and determined to achieve their mission, the leadership will not have the option of leading the church in a different direction. There is a saying, and it is very true, that goes like this: **When the followers will lead, the leaders will follow.**

That is what the CIF (**Church Information Form**) or the church's resume is about. It tells pastors who are looking for a call, what **a particular church wants** from him. If he doesn't fit the mold, he shouldn't apply. **Church members have to design the mold** of what they want to see happen to their church. **The new pastor must fit that mold.** Envisioning does that.

An Interim Pastor or part time Pulpit Supply will be in place after my departure. That pastor will serve as long as the process of finding the suitable new pastor takes. A committee whose main responsibility is to fill the pastoral vacant position has already been elected on June 21. Those elected are Dr. Thomas Brown, Mrs. Ruth Carson, Mr. Chris Dopp, Mrs. Jane Gambos, Mrs. Carolyn Glaub, Mr. Michael Paris, and Mrs. Janet Stukins. This committee will fill out the CIF form, in light of what has been agreed on during the envisioning process. The CIF will be submitted to the Presbytery Ministerial Committee and posted on the EPC denominational website. After that, the committee will be involved in visiting churches of pastors interested in the position at Starkdale, hearing pastors preach and observing the interaction with their congregations, receiving PIFs (Pastor's Information Forms), interviewing the candidates desiring the position, inviting them to preach, and calling for congregational vote.

All this would require **prayers**, **patience**, **confidentiality** and of course, **congregational unity**.

GOD IS GOOD. HE HAS BLESSED STARKDALE WITH A COM-MUNITY WIDE MINISTRY and WILL CONTINUE TO BLESS IT EVEN MORE.

IT WAS A GREAT PRIVILEGE AND HONOR INDEED TO SERVE OUR SAVIOR AND LORD ALONG YOUR SIDE. I WILL KEEP YOU AND YOUR MINISTRY IN PRAYER. BUT PLEASE KEEP ME IN YOURS.

As you know, we are now in the process of searching for a pastor. It is also worth mentioning that during the process of finding our permanent pastor, there will be a period of all-member participation in envisioning our future ministry which will be conducted by representatives from the Session and/or the Presbytery.

Meanwhile, the session is actively searching for a fulltime Interim Pastor or part-time Pulpit Supply to serve temporarily until a permanent pastor is in place.

AN ONGOING LEADERSHIP CLASS is beginning in July and will be held in the adult Sunday School Classroom from 9:30-10:30 A.M. The class will be taught by four Ruling Elders: Jeanne Cox, Jane Gambos, Carolyn Glaub, and Janice Whitaker. Why did we join the EPC? How did we choose this denomination? What is reformed theology? What is the government of the church and how does it affect the officers and church members? The class is for all in the congregation who may be led to learn the answers to these questions and more. Active, soon-tobe, and past elders and deacons, are urged to join us since "once a church officer, always a church officer and leader." According to God's Word, church leadership must be biblically sound and doctrinally convinced and uncompromising if the church is to be true to the faith. In order to keep the church healthy, the EPC requires those who are elected officers to be educated in these topics, and requires Session to facilitate the Biblical education of the congregation.

We will begin the study with Michael Horton's thought-provoking book: *Putting Amazing Back into Grace*.

For a long time in Western countries, being a Christian was normal and rejecting the doctrines of the faith was considered heresy. Today, in nominally "Christian" cultures, it's just the opposite. Being either apathetic toward or critical of orthodox Christianity is normal, and being a disciple of Christ is considered "heretical"—a departure from the spirit of the age. [...] We can't go with the flow, letting others do our thinking, believing, and living for us. We have to investigate what we believe and why we believe it. We have to make a conscious decision to trust in Christ and be formed by his Word. - Excerpt from Ch. 1 "Jumping through Hoops is for Circus Animals"


SOUP KITCHEN REPORT




